

# Cricket Dyer returns from illness to lead Hambrook to cup victory over Whitchurch

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CAPTAIN Lee Dyer had an extra reason for celebrating as Hambrook trounced Whitchurch by seven wickets at Cleeve to lift the Bateman Trophy.

The 30-year-old barely played last summer as his health slowly worsened before undergoing a kidney transplant that transformed his life.

Lee, pictured, said: "I had reflux as a baby, one kidney never worked and the other was just getting worse and worse, I was down to about 12 per cent function."

"I had been on the transplant list for two and a-half years ... and then the call came in June last year."

"My kidney came from a deceased donor, and I really can't say enough about people who put themselves forward by filling out a donor card. It's such a selfless thing to do."

After a seven-day spell in hospital and ten weeks off work - he's a team leader in Yate for Tesco van drivers - Lee spent the winter in the gym working on his fitness and looking forward to a summer of cricket which has now been capped in style by this final victory and the fact that his village side are guaranteed a top-two finish in Division One of the Globe Sports Bristol & District League.

He said: "It's been a hard year and-a-half but we're slowly starting to get there. Work were absolutely brilliant and the cricket lads have been very supportive, I can certainly appreciate what we've achieved that little bit more after everything that has happened."
